This course will concentrate on creating a visual portfolio, written resume and artist statement. The course is designed for those students pursuing a degree at College of the Desert with an emphasis in Art, Digital and Graphic Design, Architecture, or other creative arts and media areas, and serves as preparation for transfer, or for a career in these fields. The course is organized for students who work two-dimensionally, three-dimensionally or in mixed media formats. Students will develop an artist's statement and will gain understanding of the preparation of a professional portfolio and other print material. Students will plan and prepare a professional presentation of their artwork under guidance of faculty. During the presentation students will document their work through electronic formats, video, slide or flat prints.
