1. Motion Control: Shoot a roll of film of moving objects or people. Create an image in which the subject is blurry and the background is in focus. Create an image in which the subject is in focus but the background is blurred. Create an image in which the object moving very fast is in focus and the

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background is in focus. Create an image in which everything is blurry. Select one image and make an enlargement.

- 2. Open Shade portrait: Shoot a roll of open shade portraits of three different subjects out of class.
- 3. Write a short artist's statement about your work.
- 4. Complete assigned readings.
- 5. Final project: Using techniques and photographic ideas learned in this course, shoot several rolls of film of images that are related to each other, by subject matter, theme, composition, or process.

b. In-class Assignments

- -1.Photogram: Use objects to create a "shadow picture" on photographic paper. Process this paper using basic darkroom procedures.
- 2.Film development: Using exposure control techniques, shoot a roll of film and process it in chemicals using the procedure outlined for film development. Make a proof sheet in the darkroom.
- 3. Printing: Make 5 enlargements from one selected negative, using 5 different contrast filters.
- 4.Motion Control: Shoot a roll of film of moving objects or people. Create an image in which the subject is blurry and the background is in focus. Create an image in which the subject is in focus but the background is blurred. Create an image in which the object moving very fast is in focus and the background is in focus. Create an image in which everything is blurry. Select one image and make an enlargement.
- 5. Depth of Field: Take a number of images at each f-stop on your camera of a scene in which there is a subject in the foreground, background, and middle ground using depth of field to explore how the mood and subject of the image changes at different apertures. Select two images and dry mount them for class critique.
- 6.Portrait: Shoot a roll of open shade portraits of three different subjects. Print one and dry mount it for class critique.
- 7. Final project: Using techniques and photographic ideas learned in this course, shoot several rolls of film of images that are related to each other, by subject matter, theme, composition, or process. Select 7-10 images to enlarge and present by dry mounting, window matting, or in a book or portfolio format. Write a short artist's statement about your work.
