Course Content

This course surveys visual culture from select regions in Africa, Oceania, and Indigenous North America, including but not limited to: Africa:

- · Ancient Africa, including Egypt and Nubia
- Early Modern Africa, including the spread of Christianity and Islam; the Kingdoms of Aksum, Mali, Benin and Ghana; as well as Great Zimbabwe and Christian Ethiopian art
- Modern Africa, emphasizing west and central African art, including thematic exploration related to the effects of European contact, colonization, and the slave trade; ancestors and spirits; leadership and royalty; rituals and masquerades; costume and body art; and contemporary art

Indigenous North America:

- · Mound-building sites of the Adena and Mississippian cultures, including Cahokia
- · Ancestral Puebloan culture and settlements at Chaco Canyon and Mesa Verde
- · Southwest Mimbres and Pueblo pottery, Navajo painting and weaving, and Hopi katsinas
- Haida totem poles, Kwakwaka'wakw transformation masks, Chilkat blankets, and Yupik masks of the Pacific Northwest Chumash, Cahuilla, and Pomo basketry
- Regalia, beadwork, and ledger paintings of the Plains and Plateau tribes, including the Hidatsa, Shoshone, Crow, Lakota, and Cheyenne
- Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act
- · Modern and contemporary Native artists



Oceania:

- · Australia, including works related to the Aboriginal Dreamings
- · Melanesia, including the ceremonial art and architecture of New Guinea
- Micronesia, including ceremonial art and architecture, and dance, of the Caroline Islands; and navigation charts of the Marshall Islands
- Polynesia, including dance and tattooing; the moai of Rapa Nui; Tongan barkcloth; ceremonial art of the Austral and Cook Islands, and Hawaii; and ceremonial art and architecture of Maori culture in New Zealand
