This course concentrates on developing basic skills in listening, reading, speaking and writing of Japanese. Emphasis is placed on acquisition of vocabulary, structures and grammatical patterns necessary for comprehension of native spoken and written Japanese at the Novice Low to Novice mid-range of the *ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines*. As articulated in *Standards for Foreign Language Learning in the 21st Century*. The course also prepares students to be able to demonstrate their proficiencies across *the three communication modes: interpretive, interpresonal, and presentational*.

In addition to *communication*, the *5 C's* of the National Standards for Japanese Language Learning are integrated in instruction. The student will through the coursework to cover the area of *cultural competence*, *connections* to other disciplines, *comparisons* between the Japanese language and culture and those of the students, and the use of the language in multilingual *communities* beyond the school setting.

 - with appropriate context, understanding of vocabulary and grammar slightly above the beginning level;

 - Application of standard reading strategies in order to understand the global meaning of short articles, dialogues, stories, and other authentic literary and factual texts.
