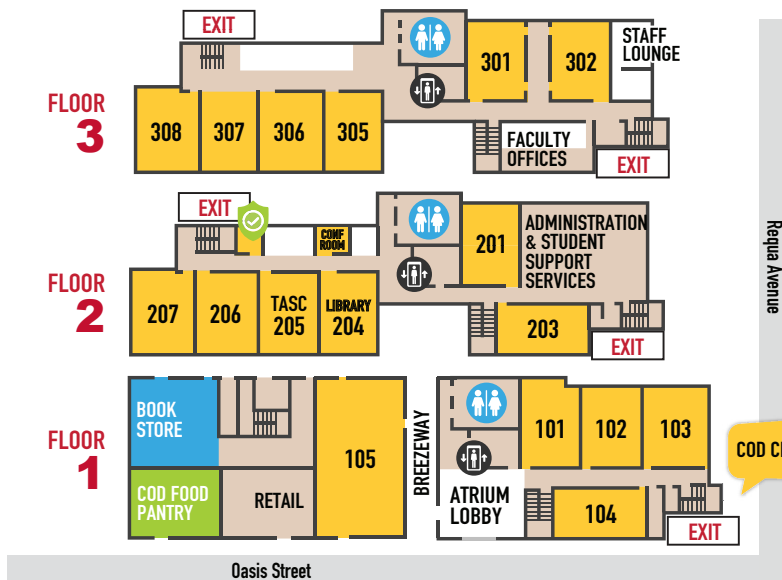
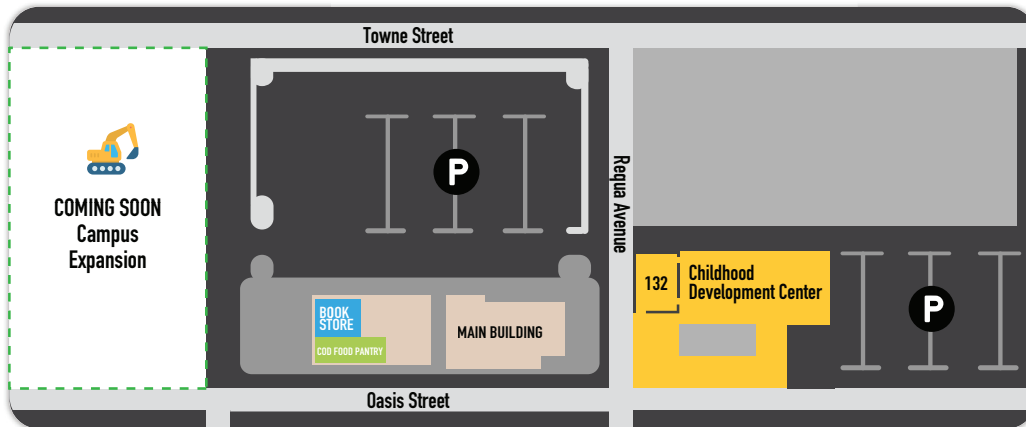

An Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) is an emergency responder trained to provide emergency medical care to the critically ill and injured. Depending on where they work, EMTs may be solely responsible for the treatment and transportation of their patients.

EMT 084 provides students with the medical knowledge and skills to become an EMT. Competencies are assessed regularly by student performance in the classroom, in the hands on skills lab and during the clinical and field internship.

Students successfully completing the course will be eligible to take the National Registry Emergency Medical Technician exam and become a nationally certified EMTs.

This course meets the EMT prerequisite for the Basic Firefighter Academy.

Tutoring and Academic Skills Center (TASC)

The Tutoring and Academic Skills Center (TASC) provides students with many academic resources to help them succeed in their courses. Students can seek help at any TASC location (Palm Desert, Indio, Palm Springs, Mecca/Thermal, and Coachella) for academic skill support. Services include Canvas and student portal navigation, computer and technology help, study skills advice, and campus resource referrals.
